

THE HIPP STORY

The help Increase the Peace Project (HIPP) a project started by the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) a Quaker based social justice organization, began in 1991 in Syracuse, New York. HIPP was founded as a variation of the Alternatives to Violence Project (AVP) for one main reason, to cover costs and humbling paying the facilitators, who were adults training youth, while with AVP it was prisoners many times training outsiders and insiders, who could not be paid. The AVP program began in 1975 when a group of inmates at Green Haven Prison (NY) was working with youth coming into conflict with the law (yes--gangs existed even then). They collaborated with the Quaker Project on Community Conflict, devising a prison workshop. The success of this workshop quickly generated requests for more, and AVP was born. The program quickly spread to many other prisons and communities around the world. HIPP is geared with the same activities, but targeted youth in schools, community centers, and those that are incarcerated. Today the famous and highly respected AVP and HIPP are around the world inside and outside the walls.

Based on popular education models, HIPP invites participants to share their personal experiences and be enriched by the knowledge of the group. HIPP combines dialogue and active learning to engage and motivate action. Participants build skills for responding to conflicts through nonviolence, analyzing impacts of social injustices in their lives and the community, and develop skills for action. Each HIPP session is designed to increase skills, understanding, collaboration, transformation, and leadership.



Save the Kids (STK) is a nonprofit organization founded in 2009 dedicated to reintegrate youth from incarceration to their community in New York state.

STK is a nonprofit organizations based in Syracuse, New York. STK is a full-volunteer collaborative organization that provides youth empowerment, leadership, group-building, nonviolence, mentoring, and reintegration based programs for youth ages of **10 to 16 years** old in New York.

STK is one of the first mentor based youth re-entry programs in the US. STK located at Hillbrook Youth Detention Center, collaborates numerous colleges, government programs and agencies, and nonprofits around the US. Save the Kids is always looking to work with more agencies, nonprofits, and scholars.

WHAT IS HIPP?

“HIPP, teaches young people and adults communication skills for conflict resolution. And it does more. HIPP confronts prejudice and renews our hope to be agents for positive social change. The training introduces alternatives to violence and bullying and allows participants to practice various options by modeling and role playing. Exercises include self-affirmation and discovery of how insensitivity can magnify problems. HIPP uses serious discussion of issues, activities that practice finding win-win solutions, and games that promote cooperation and communication. It’s straightforward and fun. HIPP affirms that there are choices, and just as we learn violence, so can we learn to respond with the alternatives. HIPP allows youth and adults to practice techniques they discover, one-on-one within the group. The accumulation of these skills then leads to a focus on community action and social change.” – American Friends Service Committee

OUR FACILITATORS

Save the Kids’ HIPP facilitators all complete the Basic, Advanced, and Training for Facilitators training. They regularly volunteer at local youth detention centers, community centers, schools, and religious centers to provide mini, day, and weekend workshops for adults and youth.
