YEL is opportunity for youth in detention to have fun participating in collaborative and group-building activities. The best thing about YEL is that youth get to hang out with young adults going to college. At the end of the night youth are given healthy fruit such as watermelons and other snacks.

Save the Kids (STK) is a nonprofit organization founded in 2009 dedicated to reintegrate youth from incarceration to their community in New York State.

STK is a nonprofit organizations based in Syracuse, New York. STK is a full-volunteer collaborative organization that provides youth empowerment, leadership, group building, nonviolence, mentoring, and reintegration based programs for youth ages of **10 to 16 years** old in New York.

STK is one of the first mentor based youth re-entry programs in the US. STK located at Hillbrook Youth Detention Center, collaborates with SUNY Cortland, Center for Community Alternatives, Syracuse University, Le Moyne College, Onondaga Community College, American Friends Service Community, GEAR Up, and many other organizations and agencies in-order to achieve our goals. We are always looking to work with more agencies, nonprofits, and scholars.

Mentor Guidelines

- Parents/guardians must be notified and approve of mentorship with their child
- All mentors must have a commitment against drugs, violence, and illegal activity
- There must be at least two mentors on accomplishing any task or on any activity/outing.
- Parents/Guardians must approve of all photos with youth
- Mentors must have a commitment against racism, sexism, homophobia, ageism, ableism, and all other forms of discrimination including those that have committed crimes.
- Mentors must be professional (with their language, behavior, and dress) and be positive role-models for youth and STK
- Mentors may not build a *personal* relationship on any level with youth
- Mentors must hold to a confidentiality of youth's records, paper work, and files
- Mentors must be at least 18 years old with no criminal record
- Always log activities and mentoring, including phone-calls, e-mails, events, run-ins, letters, text messages, etc.



Help Open Possibilities (HOP) is Save the Kids' first phase of the youth re-entry program, which is accomplished within the first month of the kids' release from an incarcerated location. HOP is based on the **Ten Steps 4 the Real World**, which are ten tasks to achieve with youth between the ages of 10 to 16 years old to accomplish.

They include:

- 1. Pledge to stay away from drugs, violence, and alcohol**
- 2. Take a college tour**
- 3. Get into school**
- 4. Get a library card**
- 5. Get an e-mail address**
- 6. Get a resume**
- 7. Get involved in after school programs**
- 8. Get a job**
- 9. Volunteer with an organization**

- 10. Keep in touch with STK!**



Call For Mentors!

1) To be a mentor, one must work or volunteer in the New York juvenile justice system (this assures that you are a mandated reporter, have signed the confidentiality agreement, and have worked with at-risk-youth).

STK believes true re-entry starts from the inside out.

2) The next step is to write a personal statement between 500 to 1,000 words about yourself and why you are interested in working with youth and Save the Kids.

3) All volunteers must be professional, have a full commitment to nonviolence, social justice, above 18 years old, and love working with kids.
